The Interim Process: Doubters, Seekers and Believers

Some folks doubt the need for our interim process. Some folks seek more information as to what it's all about. Others believe that the interim process is a way of strengthening the church. Whether you are a doubter, a seeker or a believer, your participation is important to the ongoing health of University Congregational United Church of Christ. Come be a part of our meetings. They are open to all!

Ritual, place and friends that remain pretty constant week after week give us a sense of rootedness and security in a world that is afire with change and often bent on self-destruction. Church is paradoxical in that the very constancy we long for can only be realized by entering the chaotic stream of our ever-changing environment. The mainline church is learning that standing still leads to getting stuck, and when stuck, it's hard to keep up with our ever-present God of redemptive and reconciling love.

Biblical writers uniformly depict a God who refuses to let go of humankind and creation. God is a relentless seeker wherever and in whatever form necessary to maintain relationship and offer hope and healing. Jesus is one manifestation of God's tenacity in an ever-changing human context. God adapts to maintain relationship. Can the progressive Christian church do any less?

Moses is often depicted as the quintessential interim minister. He helped a group of people form a community with a God-centered identity. Most of the years

wandering in the desert were years devoted to identity formation based on bedrock beliefs and core values. Until that community identity had been internalized, lived and articulated, any vision of a new land was beyond reach.

In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus comes from the protected shelter of Egypt and enters like Joshua into the land of promise to help his people get back in touch with core values and bedrock beliefs and become attuned to God's vision for humanity. Any interim ministry process should help a church be in touch with its identity. It's a twofold process of living one's tradition and embracing one's future. Given the rate of change in our world, the discernment work is an ongoing leadership task. Interim ministry provides a special opportunity for some outside perspective and structured congregational participation in that discernment process.

Bring your questions and your opinions about the church's identity. Join us as we use a short segment from the movie, *Walking the Line*, and James Taylor's song, *Shed a Little Light*, to help frame our work together.

As I See It

In a Mirror Dimly

V About a year ago I took a risk (for me it was a risk). I'd been looking for a better job for a while and I interviewed for what seemed like the perfect Bob Job. I told several friends about it, asking them to pray about it; not something I ever do. I didn't specify that I wanted them to pray for me to get it; just that the "right thing" happen. Even though I really wanted the "right thing" to be me getting the job. I didn't get the job. I felt: "God, what's up? I really wanted this. I tried my best to get it. I made a point of asking and even asking friends to help. Is there any point in asking?" I know this is a fairly rudimentary faith question, but tell me you haven't wondered the same thing, more or less.

In January I got a new job. I'm the executive director of Youth in Focus, an after-school photography program that seeks to empower disadvantaged youth by using cameras to help them see possibilities, to develop their voice and vision and to make positive choices. (If you're curious, look at www.youthinfocus.org) Some people have told me God has put me right where I ought



to be. Who knows? I've heard that a reward of faith is looking at your life backwards and seeing that it made sense. Tell you when I get there.

I do know this: a young African-American boy named Forrest, one of five kids living with a single foster mom, took a beginning photography class this summer. He was timid. The older students helped him. He worked hard to make his pictures perfect. Once he slipped his pictures onto the desk of a staff member but left before she could comment on them. His teacher cared for him. At the end of the class his mom said his self-confidence had gone "through the roof." His brother, not a guy given to public speaking, talked about how much the class meant to Forrest. In his artist statement accompanying his final exhibit Forrest wrote: "I feel good when I see my pictures."

I believe that the world, in spite of a lot of the evidence, is shot through with love because it's made that way. Whatever else God is up to, my work, our work, must be about the work of love.

From Memory

V When I was a child I learned to recite several Psalms, many proverbs, and a great assortment of verses from various books of the Old and New Testament. I received a prize for memorizing, in correct order, the books of the Bible. As an adult, I have been grateful to have so much of Scripture memorized. It helps me in sermon preparation, Trivial Pursuit, and very often, in my spiritual journey. But I never memorized the Beatitudes, much less the whole Sermon on the Mount. So this year, I am, at age 54 (and I'll be 55 shortly), taking up the challenge. This "challenge" is actually an invitation to all to memorize the Sermon on the Mount, and then enjoy a lunch with your pastors at the top of the Space Needle to celebrate.

Now I don't want to be up there with you if I haven't done my work too. So this last week, I realized I had better get started. As I began, several feelings came back to me. I remembered how it was as a child, working words over and over again until I had their sound and rhythm in my mind and in such a way that they would pour out of me when I started my recitation. I remembered what it is like to lose one's place and have to go

back to some more familiar string of words to jump in again. I remembered the satisfaction of completing the task. And so I announce to you all, I have done it. I now can recite all the Beatitudes from memory, as found in the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible.

As I worked with the words of those first fifteen verses of Matthew 5, I noticed some things. In the "interesting but not particularly significant" category is the observation that all of the Beatitudes except one start with either "p" or "m." (I'll leave it to you to see which one is the nonconformist.) I also observed that the Beatitudes begin and end with the promise of "the kingdom of heaven." I'm still thinking through what that might mean. And finally, I realized that the invitation to memorize the whole Sermon on the Mount is big. But memorizing the thirteen verses of the Beatitudes is pretty doable. So here is my new invitation. Join me, step by step, on this memorization journey. For October and the rest of November, we'll work on the Beatitudes. Then we'll go from there.

I'll keep you posted on how I am doing, and you can let me know how you are doing. I will keep a list, and we'll see how far we can get. In this world that calls for so much from us who hold a vision of God's call to justice and peace (the kingdom of Heaven), it will be nice to have these words we can take with us wherever we go to offer us encouragement and guidance.

Church Playground Improvements

We're excited to have a new fence that encircles the church playground. It's the right fence for the job. It's guaranteed to be maintenance free for 20 years—and will stand up to late night visitors. It was deliberately chosen to reflect the urban nature of the surrounding buildings. The \$13,000 fence was paid for by all four users: Trettin Drop-in Preschool, the Child Learning & Care Center, The Children's School, and the church.

Church member, Jeff Jacques, constructed a new shed underneath the slide. It was paid for out of a \$10,000 grant awarded to the childcare programs (Trettin and the Child Learning & Care Center) for emergency preparedness. The grant originated from County Councilman Bob Ferguson's office after a representative visited the programs. It will be used to store water, canned food, and supplies.

Marcus Borg, former Seabeck speaker and internationally known Biblical and Jesus scholar, will be giving a lecture on "A Tale of Two Christianities" on **Friday, Feb. 23, 2007 at 7 p.m.** at University Congregational United Church of Christ. Cost for the lecture is \$15. A Declaration of Peace in Iraq

"Most deadly month yet in Iraq," we keep reading. A new study by Johns Hopkins University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology suggests that 650,000 civilians have been killed in the Iraq War; more than 2500 U.S. soldiers have died. According to a recent poll, 73% of troops on the ground in Iraq endorse a withdrawal.

A Declaration of Peace, endorsed by the United Church of Christ Justice and Witness Ministries and at least 400 other organizations, calls for a comprehensive, concrete and rapid plan to end the war.
